BOARD MATTERS

Dear friends,

As some of you know, I've been dealing with a serious health issue lately and will continue to do so for the next year or so, but all in all, I'm doing very well, fighting hard, and expecting to make full recovery on the sunny side of the dirt! I deeply appreciate all your prayers and other considerations and count myself most blessed for your warm and unfailing friendship.

Chris Curtin will continue as Board Member and Saplings Program Manager for western counties. Darrell Sheffield will continue as Board Member at Large. Derrick Morris is joining as a Board Member and Education Program Manager for western counties.

In addition, we've been fortunate to be able to fill three Officer positions. Todd Jackson begins his role as Treasurer this month. Betty Larsen will serve as Secretary for special events such as festivals, sapling rescues, and planting projects. And Holly Cochran will serve as Recording Secretary for our Leadership Team meetings.

In the near future, we hope to identify an individual to be our Education Program Manager for eastern counties and one to fill the role of Facilitator Program Manager. So if any of you would be interested or know of any well qualified person you'd like to recommend, please let me know.

ACTIVITY REVIEW Q1 2021

* **THANKS** for a productive first quarter. Activity reports were received from all Board Members (YEA!!!), but we're still missing a few from other Leadership Team members. Please remember they're due within a week after the end of each calendar quarter.

 - Hemlock Help Line available 7 days a week with 294 calls handled as of 3/31/21.
 - 4 **Facilitator Training Workshops** with total of 19 new Facilitators trained as of 3/31/21. Total active Facilitators = 422 in Georgia and 88 in other states.
 - 1 Hemlock Lesson for 12 youth & adults:
 - 2 customized training sessions for 7 volunteers and public land managers:
 - 2 articles / news items written by, with the assistance of, or about SGH published in newspapers/magazines.
 - 37 Facilitator visits made with charitable treatment of 123 trees.

 - 7 hemlock rescue projects with 12 volunteers, 283 saplings rescued and potted for use in educational / service activities or future adoption:

CHANGES TO BUSINESS MODEL

* New SGH Intern – As we have grown as an organization and increased the scope of our education and service activities, we have developed a great need for help with some of our newer initiatives as well as certain administrative tasks. So it looked like perfect timing when Dr. Jonathan Micancin, Biology Professor at Young Harris College contacted us about the possibility of have a summer intern. He assisted us in posting the position on YHC's on-line bulletin board and recommended a most excellent candidate.

Brianna Ross is a rising senior at YHC with a double major in Biology and Environmental Science and minor in Chemistry. She has done extra course work in native flora of north Georgia, ecology, and conservation biology and has also participated in a couple of SGH hemlock treatment projects on the Young Harris campus.

Following the Board's initial approval and an interview with Dave Teffeteller and Chris Curtin, we have final approval for Brianna to join us from early May and continuing to mid-August. After completing our Volunteer Facilitator Training Workshop, she will be working an average of 15 - 20 hours a week as a contractor compensated at \$10 an hour. With flexibility being key, she will work with Donna and various Board Members on a wide variety of activities.

* New Option for getting treatment projects done – On rare occasions SGH is asked (or we offer) to do a large project, but despite all our good faith efforts to recruit project leadership and enough volunteers, especially for a project that may extend over several days or even weeks, we come up short. So rather than abandon the project or delay it unreasonably, the Board was asked to consider changing our Bylaws to allow us to put such projects out for a labor-only competitive bid among professional pesticide applicators, specifically excluding Hemlock Doctor or any other company with a personal tie to SGH to avoid conflict of interest.

The reasoning behind this request relates primarily to the fact that donors give us their money to help save the trees, and we believe they don't particularly care how it gets done as long as the trees are saved. Jim Wentworth and Dave Teffeteller offered to help prepare the bid documents for two projects we're currently aware of that might require this kind of arrangement – one on Lake Burton in Rabun County and one on the Cartecay Tract in Gilmer County.

The Board approved this new arrangement to be used if and when it is deemed absolutely necessary, and our Bylaws will be amended accordingly. It is expected that the first bid request will go out some time in June.

* Activities to cut back or discontinue – During this time or transition and reorganization, the Board was asked to consider whether there are any activities we've been doing that are beyond the scope of our core mission and that we should consider either cutting back or discontinuing. Feedback will be requested at our summer meeting.

SERVICE - SAPLINGS

* Sapling nurseries

We need another saplings nursery in one of our western counties. Any volunteers to serve as a nursery host?
Donna still has a limited number of small trees and plans to transfer her nursery to a Facilitator who has

expressed an interest in hosting one in Blue Ridge.

* Sapling rescues

- Total of 250 large and 300 small saplings are needed for private adoptions, public plantings, hemlock restoration projects, and festivals we'll participate in this summer and fall.

- Chris and Buz are asked to proceed independently to schedule rescue/potting projects over the summer and fall, involving Facilitators who have expressed interest. Brianna Ross is available to participate and also to help recruit volunteers.

– Project Chimps – Chris is asked with Christy Jellets and Ryan Kennedy to determine if they want our help on this. If so, the time frame will be this fall.

* Sapling adoptions

- When a saplings nursery host is contacted by someone wanting to adopt saplings, the host should let the client know how our adoption program works, send the client the Adoptions Program document, and explain that the client should be prepared to make their donation by cash or check at the time of adoption.

- The client should be asked to fill out our membership form at the time of adoption, including the amount of donation and number of saplings adopted.

- * **Hemlock restoration** This was not discussed but will be on the agenda for our summer meeting. Time frame for planting projects will be this fall.

SERVICE - OTHER

* **EZ-Ject soil injectors to lend:** SGH has 5 of these injectors to lend. All units have a standard output of ¹/₄ ounce of liquid per pump, and a mixing/dosing card is attached to each. They're hosted by:

Buz Stone in Rabun County
Jim Wentworth in Union County
Derrick Morris in Gilmer County

Jimmy Stewart in Dade County Donna in Lumpkin County

If someone wants to borrow an EZ-Ject, the host will obtain a \$250 deposit check payable to SGH and the borrower's contact information, indicate whether there is any time limit on the borrowing, and provide usage / maintenance instruction. When the unit is returned and before the deposit check is given back to the borrower, the host will check the unit for any damage and proper functioning.

* **Repair of Kioritz soil injectors:** Two kinds of metal parts are needed to be manufactured to repair a couple of injectors currently on our work bench. The Board asked Donna to obtain an estimate of the cost. She will check with Cleveland Tool & Design and present the quote for approval.

* Chemicals to share:

- Anyone needing chemical for charitable use is asked to contact Donna and she will order it.

- Because of the increase in the cost of chemicals, Donna requests that the one-time purchase limit be increased from \$300 to \$500 and the Bylaws amended accordingly.

- When a Facilitator does a **charitable service project** (based on a true financial need as defined in our Bylaws) to help a client get their trees treated using chemical provided by SGH, there is the expectation that the client will participate in the partnership in some way and do *something* to help the cause; however, there is no expectation that the client provide reimbursement for the cost of the chemicals used.

- When a Facilitator does a **neighborly service project** (where there is no true financial need as defined in our Bylaws) to help a client get their trees treated using chemical provided by SGH, there is the expectation that the client will reimburse SGH for at least the cost of the chemicals used. Check with Donna for the chemical costs. Such reimbursement should be made at the time of service by cash or check, accompanied by a completed membership form, and forwarded to Donna at the end of the month. Recipients of neighborly service projects may also make an additional donation by mail or Paypal at any time if they are so inclined.
