Annual Report for Fiscal 2010

Dear Friends of Save Georgia's Hemlocks:

We are pleased to present our 2010 Annual Report. The year was an extremely productive one in which clear goals and careful planning led to significant accomplishments and laid a solid foundation for future progress in the battle to save the hemlocks – thanks to the amazing dedication, hard work, and support of our Board Members and Officers, Facilitators, members, and hundreds of other volunteers. The hemlocks raise their branches in gratitude!

Developing Clear Vision

The year began with a review and refinement of our mission, vision, and goals to ensure clarity of purpose and provide a solid foundation for planning our programs to serve all of north Georgia where the hemlock woolly adelgid (HWA) is a serious threat.

Mission: Save Georgia's Hemlocks is a 100% volunteer non-profit organization of concerned citizens dedicated to saving endangered hemlocks through education and charitable service.

<u>Vision</u>: Through our efforts of preservation, conservation and restoration, there will be a healthy population of hemlocks in Georgia for future generations.

Goals: Our goals are to:

- **Educate** Enhance public awareness of the hemlock woolly adelgid crisis, current practical options, and emerging control technologies;
- **Enable** Ensure easy access to hemlock information, advice regarding economical solutions and direct assistance to property owners; and

• **Encourage** – Establish understanding of the aesthetic, economic and environmental reasons for property owners to take timely and effective action to save their hemlocks.

Achieving Vital Goals

The level of awareness about our threatened hemlocks and the community momentum to save them greatly increased in 2010. Thanks to the efforts of so many wonderful people all over north Georgia who spread the word, took care of their own trees, helped their neighbors, and shared much appreciated financial support, we were able to:

- Expand the Hemlock Help Program into 9 counties,
- Present the hemlock message to 1,500 people,
- Increase our trained facilitators to 73 volunteers, and

• Provide direct help through the Hemlock Help Line and charitable service projects to 800 individuals and groups working to save their hemlocks. A wonderfully fun and educational year-end highlight was our first annual Hemlock Camp Meeting – "a gathering of kindred spirits to celebrate and preserve the magnificent hemlock" – held at beautiful Anderson Creek Retreat in Ellijay. Exercising Careful Stewardship

Our application for 501(c)3 nonprofit status with the IRS was approved early in the year. And despite the continued difficulties in the economy, Save Georgia's Hemlocks was the beneficiary of astounding generosity from members and other individuals as well as other nonprofits – more than double the level of the previous year. Through careful use of these resources, we were able to devote 84% of our spending to educational programs such as Hemlock Help Clinics, Facilitator training, and other presentations and to charitable service efforts such as hemlock treatment and hemlock planting projects. We are very grateful to all those who have supported our work.

Planning for the Future

This coming year is likely to be a "tipping point" year for the hemlocks in many Georgia counties. With the rapid spread of the HWA and severe budget cuts facing our public land managers, the trees are in increased danger, and private property owners will be an important key to their very survival. Here are the highlights of our 2011 strategic plan.

- More counties to be served
- More Hemlock Help Clinics and other education
- More volunteer facilitators to be trained

• More services, including hemlock treatment and planting projects and other charitable service initiatives

- More outreach to community and youth groups
- More volunteer opportunities to help

Snapshot of Accomplishments

as of November 30, 2010*

- Received final approval of 501(c)(3) nonprofit status from IRS
- Added Murray and Lumpkin Counties to Hemlock Help Program, bringing the total to 9 Georgia counties served
- Conducted 14 Hemlock Help Clinics with 205 attendees and gave 15 other presentations with 1,261 attendees/contacts
- Presented Hemlock Lessons (with tree plantings) for 3 schools or children's groups including 75 students and 7 teachers
- Held 7 Volunteer Facilitator Training Workshops, gaining 44 new GA Facilitators and 14 new TN/NC Facilitators, bringing the total Facilitator network to 73
- Led 5 Neighborhood Hemlock Help Planning Workshops with 29 attendees
- Provided 2 Mentoring Workshops for out-of-state organizations with 16 participants
- Participated in 6 Volunteer Hemlock Help projects by special request with 23 participants and approximately 25 Volunteer Hemlock Help projects by Facilitator initiative with 16 participants who contributed 270 hours treating 1500+ trees on 375 private property parcels all on a totally charitable basis
- Held our first annual Hemlock Camp Meeting with 113 attendees and participants, including 14 exhibitors/presenters, 15 students volunteers, and 8 organizing volunteers contributing 257 hours
- Handled 893 calls on Hemlock Help Line and helped over 400 individuals or groups take action to save their hemlocks
- Published 18 articles
- Gave 6 radio/TV/newspaper interviews
- Logged over 2,200 volunteer hours by Board members, Facilitators, and other volunteers
- Achieved a use-of-resources ratio of 84% for education and charitable service programs and 16% for administrative expenses for FY 2010. Cumulative ratio for FY 2009-2010 is 85% for education and charitable service, 15% for administrative expenses.
