#### Dr. Justin Ellis, Keynote Speaker

Dr. Ellis is a lecturer and the Director of the Environmental Leadership Center at the University of North Georgia in Dahlonega. With a Bachelor's degree from Birmingham Southern College in 1997 and a Ph.D in Agroecology from Odum School of Ecology, University of Georgia in 2013, his research interests focus on the development of sustainability innovations that restore degraded ecosystems.

Dr. Ellis' responsibilities also include the UNG Ecological Protection Lab (formerly the Beetle Lab), which has led in regional efforts to protect the Eastern Hemlock from the invasive Wooly Adelgid by initiating biological control efforts through the rearing and release of predatory beetles to reduce adelgid numbers and impacts.

The title of today's presentation is "Biological Controls and Geospatial Data in the Long-Term Protection of Hemlock Ecosystems."
